The Arab equivalent of Marco Polo, Sheikh Ibn Battuta (1304-77) set out as a young man on a pilgrimage to Mecca that ended 27 years and 75,000 miles later. The only medieval traveler known to have visited the lands of every Muslim ruler of his time, Ibn Battuta was born into a family of highly respected religious judges and educated as a theologian.

Ibn Battutah traveled through parts of the Indian Ocean, such as on a brief stay in the Maldives and visits to Ceylon (Sri Lanka), and eventually went on a diplomatic mission to China to deliver to the Chinese emperor a gift on behalf of Sultan Muhammad ibn Tughluq, ruler of much of India at the time.
